Exercise: Revise an Argument

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- → Print your paper.
- → Underline your thesis statement.
- → Underline every topic sentence in each paragraph in your paper.
 - ☐ Make sure:
 - ✓ That every paragraph has a topic sentence;
 - ✓ There is only one topic sentence per paragraph.

Now, go back and read only the underlined sentences in your paper.

- → Every topic sentence should relate directly to your thesis statement. Your topic sentences will support your thesis statement, advance your argument, and clearly transition your ideas.
- → Do your topic sentences:
 - ☐ Support your thesis statement?
 - ✓ Do you need to change the order of paragraphs (or information in the paragraph) to clarify or advance your argument?
 - ✓ Or do you need rewrite your thesis to reflect the new direction your paper is taking?
 - ☐ Advance your argument?
 - ✓ Are your topic sentences different from each other?
 - ✓ Do you need to brainstorm more points?
 - ☐ Transition between ideas clearly?
 - ✓ What should be moved or deleted to clarify your idea?
 - ✓ What should be added to make your argument flow better?
 - ☐ Form a beginning, middle, and end to your argument?
 - ✓ Do you clearly introduce your argument to the reader?
 - ✓ Is there enough evidence in the body of your essay?
 - ✓ Is there a conclusion to your argument?

Confirm that your essay has flow.

- ☐ You should be able to read every underlined sentence (your thesis statement and each topic sentence). They will flow coherently, and make a mini-essay that clearly outlines your argument.
 - ✓ Are all points covered well?
 - ✓ What is skipped?
 - ✓ Do you repeat yourself?
 - ✓ Is your argument in an order that makes sense to the reader?
- ☐ Think about what you need to add, delete, or move, to ensure your argument convinces the reader.
