## Thesis Statement Checklist

Is your thesis statement	
	Worth presenting, and is the answer to a question that could be debated? (i.e., it is not an obvious truism or vague generalization.)
	Expressed concisely in one or two complete sentences?
	Supportable by details, facts, and examples within the assigned limitations of time and space?
Does your thesis statement	
	Make an argument or present a point of view?
	Go beyond announcing your topic?  Do more than state a fact, and instead tell a <i>how</i> or <i>why</i> ?
	Act as a roadmap that unifies all the ideas in your essay?
	Lay out a structure that you can follow in the body of your essay?
	Include only ideas that you fully explain in your essay?
	Fit the evidence you use in your paper?
